MSP Directive

Geographical coverage

MSPD applies to marine waters:

(1) Waters, seabed and subsoil as defines in point (1)(a) of Article 3 Marine Strategy Framework Directive


and

(2)Coastal waters as defined point 7 of Article 2 of

Water Framework Directive

In practice:

MSPD covers coastal waters, territorial waters and EEZ of 22 coastal EU Member States, does not cover overseas countries and territories of Annex II of the Treaty and French overseas Departments and Collectivities.







MSP Directive's Requirements:


- To Establish a Maritime Spatial Plan
- Apply an ecosystem-based approach
- Promote coherence
- Take land-sea interactions into account
- Spatial and temporal distribution of activities
- Involve stakeholders
- Use best available data
- Cooperate with bordering Member States and non-EU countries


However:

- Member States in charge of actual planning.
- MSPD lists the possible activities to be included, however it is mainly to MS to decide on the inclusion and on the content.
- MSPD does not determine whether the Plan has to be « legally binding ».

Establishing maritime spatial plans: overview of progress

NEWS ANNOUNCEMENT 3 May 2022 Directorate-General for Maritime Affairs and Fisheries

European Commission report on implementation of Maritime Spatial Planning Directive: good progress but more work needed

COM/2022/185 final of 3 May 2022

- (1) early starters and already had plans (BE,NL,DE,MT,LT)
- (2) succeeded within the deadline fixed by the directive or later (FI,LV,PL,DK,FR,IE,SI,SE,EE,PT(except Azores) ES, LT and HR).
- (3) Still 5 MS (CY,IT,RO,EL,BG) with no MSPs. Infringement procedures ongoing. "Reasoned opinions" sent on 19.04.2023 (2nd stage in the procedure).











Member State Expert Group on MSP

Member States Expert Group E01682/2- Maritime Spatial Planning is a Sub-Group of for Maritime Policy Member State Experts Group.

Mission:


- (a) to serve as an informal forum of national experts on implementation of MSP Directive.
- (b) to establish cooperation/coordination between the COM and MS or stakeholders on questions relating to policies in the field of MSP.
- (c) exchange of experience and good practice in the field of MSP.

Meets twice a year.











EU support to cross-border projects

- **Obligation** for MSs to cooperate (Art. 11 of MSPD)
- Min. 2 EU MSs, but non-EU countries can be involved
- Support the work of MS for cross-border planning
- Develop a **vision by sea basin**: future uses, needs and development options
- Ensure effective **engagement of stakeholders** in design and implementation of MSP
- Supported through **EMFAF**, but also **Horizon Europe**, **Interreg**, **LIFE** and national funding




MSP status around the world by April 2022:

Cooperation with IOC UNESCO

Past: MSPGlobal - 1,4 Million Euros - 3 years (2018-2020)

Main work streams: 1) Develop guidance on Cross-border MSP

2) 2 Pilot projects in the South East Pacific and in Mediterranean

In addition: International MSP Forum was established (5 edditions)

Future (in preparation): MSPGlobal 2.0 - 1 Million (from EMFAF WP 2022-2023) - 1,5-2 years (2023-2025)

Project in preparation (implementaiton of Guidance, again 2 Pilot projects planned, MSPforum(s))





Joint Roadmaps on MSP (DG MARE/IOC UNESCO)

- March 2017 DG MARE and the IOC-UNESCO adopted a "Joint Roadmap to accelerate Maritime/Marine Spatial Planning processes worldwide". This MSProadmap (2017-2021) included ten actions divided into five priority areas.
- November 2022 during the International MSP Conference in Barcelona Updated Joint Roadmap to accelerate Marine/Maritime Spatial Planning processes worldwide - MSProadmap (2022-2027). It covers a set of six priority areas divided into cross-cutting and thematic pillars:

Cross-cutting

- 1. Knowledge support
- 2. Capacity development and awareness
- 3. Transboundary cooperation

Thematic

- 1. Climate-smart MSP
- 2. Marine protection and restoration
- 3. Sustainable blue economy
